"We waited, and at last our expectations were fulfilled", writes the Serbian Bishop Nikolai of Ochrid, describing the Easter service at Jerusalem." When the Patriarch sang, "Christ is risen", a heavy burden fell from our souls. We felt as if we also had been raised from the dead. All at once, from all around, the same cry resounded like the noise of many waters. "Christ is risen" sang the Greeks, the Russians, the Arabs, the Serbs, the Copts, the Armenians, the Ethiopians - one after another, each in his own tongue, in his own melody. Coming out from the service at dawn, we began to regard everything in the light of the glory of Christ's Resurrection, and all appeared different from what it had yesterday; everything seemed better, more expressive, more glorious. Only in the light of the Resurrection does life receive meaning."

BOOK REVIEW

"So why had we come to the monastery? And why were we planning to stay here for the rest of our lives? We knew very well. It was because, for each of us, a new world had suddenly opened up, incomparable in its beauty. And that world had turned out to be boundlessly more attractive than the one in which we had previously lived..."—preface from **Everyday Saints**

An incomparably beautiful new world is exactly what unfolds in the pages of **Everyday Saints** by Archimandrite Tikhon, the abbot of Moscow's Stretensky Monastery. **Everyday Saints** chronicles the life of young Tikhon, who enters into the Church as the communist grip of Soviet Russia is weakening. His journey begins at the Pskov Caves Monastery where he encounters fellow monastics who are Soviet war heros, demanding old misers, and clair-voyants. Most importantly, what young Tikhon discovers is that these monastics are, above all humble lovers of Christ. Seventy years of crushing atheistic rule couldn't extinguish the fervent fire of faith that burns within these souls. This book will introduce you to these modern martyrs who continued to live the faith while enduring brutal torment. Archimandrite Tikhon also explores the wealth of miracles that have blossomed as a result of this faith. From the last of the sisters of the Diveyevo Monastery who lived to fulfill Saint Seraphim's enigmatic prophecy, to the discovery of the relics of Saint Tikhon (+d. 1926), the miracles are a powerful reminder of the presence of God. **Everyday Saints** will set your soul aflame, and you will share the sentiment of Archimandrite Tikhon when he proclaims that, "I could scarcely understand whether I was in Heaven or on Earth."


